Pleasantville City Council Meeting

December 21, 2021, at 5:30pm

Mayor Marsh opened the public hearing with Council Members Kody Jurgens, Rachel Lopez, Clinton Wallace, and Jordan Van Ness present. Council Member Kyle Patterson was absent. Mayor Marsh announced the public hearing is regarding the rezoning of Stubbs Commercial Plat 1; lot 1 to be rezoned from A-1 to R-2, lots 2,3 and outlot X to be rezoned from A-1 to C-1. He asked if there were any written or oral comments or questions from the public. City Administrator/Police Chief, Joe Mrstik, stated that he has not received any written or oral comments. With no other oral comments council member Van Ness made a motion to close the public hearing. Seconded by Lopez, all voting in favor. Motion carried.

Mayor Marsh wished the new council members and mayor luck as they start Jan. 1st.

Council Member Wallace gave his gratitude for serving as a council member the last 4 years.

Council Member Jurgens and Mrstik gave thanks to the mayor and council members for their service.

Mrstik informed the council that we have been awarded the CDBG grant for the State St. water main project.

Butch Hayes informed the council that the Friends of the Pleasantville East Elementary School Foundation have received \$325 in donations.

Becky Michael asked about the Stubbs rezoning, Mayor Marsh explained this will be discussed after the consent agenda.

Eric Hoffman was in attendance on behalf of the library. They held a holiday party that had a great turn out. He gave thanks to the council and mayor for the sacrifices they made to help fund the library.

Motion by Wallace, seconded by Van Ness to approve the consent agenda as follows; approval of previous council meeting minutes with a correction to the Nov. 7, 2021 minutes that Wallace was present for the meeting, approval of November 2021 financial reports, approval of water consumption report for November 2021, approval of employee comp time, approval of Police Report and approval of the following bills: All voting in favor, motion carried.

New Business:

Engineer, Jordan Stoermer, explained that Cass Stubbs is wanting to split his ag land and rezone the parcels. This has gone to Planning and Zoning Commission twice. The first time it was denied, and Mr. Stubbs was given recommendations to change some of his parcel splits and zoning. Mr. Stubbs has changed his plat with the recommendations and presented an updated plat to the Planning and Zoning Commission. The Planning and Zoning Commission has approved it and is recommends approval by the city council. Stoermer explained the lot adjacent to the bank property is already zoned C-1, Mr. Stubbs is wanting to add one more C-1 lot adjacent to the existing C-1 lot and the remaining property be zoned R-2. Council member Jurgens explained that when this was discussed the first time, the council had discussed putting restrictions in place for the type of business and hours of operation. Attorney, Bob Stuyvesant, explained if the council wants restrictions they have to be listed in the Ordinance. Mrstik asked the council to report back to him before the special meeting with restrictions they would like to see put in place. Motion by Van Ness, seconded by Wallace to table Ordinance No. 2112, amending zoning for Stubbs Commercial Plat 1. All voting in favor motion carried.

Motion by Wallace, seconded by Lopez to approve handout added to packet from Mrstik for police training. All voting in favor motion carried.

Mrstik explained there is a polygraph school he would like to attend; it starts in August and will be held in Council Bluffs. It's \$5,500 for the schooling and that doesn't include lodging. The cost of the equipment is between \$9,000-\$11,000 and Mrstik informed the council that he will pay for that himself. He explained he talked to Sheriff Sandholdt and County Attorney, Ed Bull and there is not a polygraph examiner in Marion County that can do polygraph examinations. This would bring revenue back to the city as he can resource it out. He explained he would be available during the evening hours and weekends to respond to calls and emails. He would also be available from Friday evening through Sunday in person. He explained that he would enter into a contract with the city, if he would retire or separate from the city the service would always be available to the city. He informed the council that at this time DCI is backlogged and is not available to do the polygraph examinations to other agencies. Council Member Wallace asked about the validity of the examinations. Mrstik explained an employer can't eliminate someone from employment if they fail, however it's a useful tool to use. Stuyvesant informed the council that the city will want to enter into a contract with Mrstik. Wallace asked Mrstik if he is asking for just the cost of the course. Mrstik explained it would be the cost of the course plus lodging. Eric Hoffman asked Mrstik how long the certification is for and how often he would need CEU's. Mrstik explained the CEU's are available to take online, and he wasn't sure the timeframe of the recertification. Hoffman asked if the service would be at no cost for other agencies. Mrstik explained if it's for a criminal case it there wouldn't be a cost, but it would for pre-employment background checks. Mrstik explained to the council that the class will be in the new budget year and those costs can be discussed while working on the budget. Motion by Wallace, seconded by Lopez to approve polygraph examination training for Mrstik subject to negotiation of a contract for costs related to the city plus future service. All voting in favor motion carried.

Mrstik explained Iowa Prison Industries have opened back up and reached back out to them for a quote for the wayfinding signs. He explained the Chamber of Commerce has donated \$2500 and the school is going to donate \$500. The cost of the wayfinding signs is \$3551. We will also need to order posts; he would like to get the signs ordered now. Motion by Wallace, seconded by Jurgens to approve \$352 for wayfinding signs. All voting in favor motion carried.

Stoermer informed the council that the construction work is still ongoing, the contractor has all the work completed with the materials that are on site. We are still waiting on some items to arrive. This payment is \$102,603.80. Also, the contractor has submitted an official request to extend the contract based on the shortage of the materials and how long it takes the materials to arrive. Motion by Jurgens, seconded by Van Ness to approve the pay app. To CL Carroll in the amount of \$102,603.80. All voting in favor motion carried.

Motion by Wallace, seconded by Jurgens to accept Exhibit A from Snyder & Associates regarding the parcel split. All voting in favor motion carried.

Stoermer explained there are no red flags for the parcel split, however, if the council approves the split with the plat of survey Snyder & Associates recommend the following: 1. the survey needs to show the existing homestead meets county zoning requirement setbacks. 2. The survey need to show the location of the septic system and lateral fields and verify that they do not cross the property line and meeting county zoning requirements. 3. Identify on the survey the location of an existing well that may service the existing homestead. Motion by Wallace, seconded by Van Ness, to approve the parcel split contingent upon Snyder & Associates recommendations added to the plat of survey. All voting in favor motion carried.

Mrstik recommended the council hire Lance Eysink as the full-time officer. When he left the city, he left on good terms. Mrstik also recommended the council hire him at the salary he was at when he left the city, \$24.79 per hour. He also recommends the council approve a \$.81 increase for officer Gilbert for his salary to match Lance Eysink's. Mrstik informed the council that he has almost completed the background check. Wallace asked if he would be brought back as lieutenant, Mrstik informed them he would be brought back as an officer. Wallace asked if there would be an increase after a probation period, Mrstik explained there would not be an increase until the annual salary increases. Motion by Wallace, seconded by Jurgens to approve Lance Eysink as a full-time officer at \$24.79 per hour. All voting in favor motion carried. Motion by Jurgens, seconded Wallace to approve a \$.81 salary increase for officer Gilbert to \$24.79 per hour. All voting in favor motion carried.

Motion by Wallace, seconded by Lopez to adjourn. All voting in favor motion carried.
