Pleasantville City Council Meeting May 17, 2022, at 5:30pm

Mayor Brandon Pennington opened the public hearing for the FY 2022 budget amendment with Council Members Kyle Patterson, Jordan Van Ness, Jon Koehn, and Rachel Lopez present. Jon Koehn and Rachel Lopez were present via zoom. Council Member Kody Jurgens was absent. City Clerk, Rachel Reed, provided a detailed report of each revenue and expense fund that needs amended. American Rescue Plan funds received, recreation registrations, sponsors and tournament fees have increased. Recreation expenses have increased due to registration increases. Final CDBG and SRF draws were received, and final payments made for the Jasper St. project and now receiving special assessments for the project. Expenses and revenue received for the WWTP Digester Project. General engineering and insurance costs have increased. Adkins Development in underway and expect engineering and legal expenses. State Street Water Main Project expenses for design and engineering fees. Radio read meters need purchased to update the city's water billing system. Motion by Patterson, seconded by Van Ness to close the public hearing for the FY 2022 budget amendment. All voting in favor motion carried.

Council member Koehn informed the council that he had been approached by a citizen regarding a flag on Japer St. with profanity on it. Attorney, Bob Stuyvesant, explained he has delt with this with in some of the other cities he represents. This issue has gone to federal court and the courts ruled that it is a freedom of speech. Koehn also stated that there are a lot of cars that run the stop signs at the Jasper and State St. intersection. Police Chief, Joe Mrstik, stated he would send out a message to his officers for extra patrol in the area.

Public Works Director, Shawn Breazeale, informed the council that there were water pressure issues a couple of weeks ago. He found there were contractors that had been doing work at the school and shut off two water main valves. Breazeale expressed the city should be notified prior to any valves being shut off by a contractor.

Mrstik informed the council that Parks and Rec Director, Jordan Flaws, is working with a silver card group for kids to paint the shelter house. They plan to paint the 22nd and 23rd. Mrstik asked the council about advertising with KNIA for the Pig Out Celebration, the council agreed that the advertising should be paid for by the Betterment Committee. Mrstik explained that he has not received any new applications for the police officer position. He informed the council that he and Reed completed the required reporting for the ARP funds. Mrstik informed the council that we did not receive the Downtown Revitalization grant for the old East Elementary School building. However, the state reached out to Simmering & Cory and encouraged us to apply for the grant again as they feel it is a good project. The state wants to see a developer's agreement in place when we reapply. Mrstik explained that he has reached out to the developer that we have been working with to discuss an agreement.

Library Director, JoEllen Glick, gave the council a brief update about the summer library programs. Motion by Patterson, seconded by Van Ness to approve the consent agenda as follows; approval of previous council meeting minutes, approval of April 2022 financial reports, approval of water consumption report for April 2022, approval of employee comp time, approval of Police Report, approval of Tobacco/Nicotine/Vapor Permit for Casey's General Store, approval of Tobacco/Nicotine/Vapor Permit for Dollar General Store, approval of Tobacco/Nicotine/Vapor Permit for Solar Drops Vapor, and approval of the following bills: All voting in favor, motion carried.

New Business:

Public Works Director, Shawn Breazeale, received a quote for iHydrants from Clow Valve. These hydrants have remote sensors that monitor pressure and temperature of the water system. They have cell services and will notify public works if there is a pressure loss. Breazeale would like to purchase 3 of them. The cost for 3 is \$12,754 plus \$300 per year per hydrant for the cell service. Motion by Van Ness, seconded by Patterson to purchase 3 iHydrants for \$12,754 and the cell service for \$900 per year. All voting in favor motion carried.

Motion by Patterson, seconded by Van Ness to approve the FY 2022 budget amendment. All voting in favor motion carried.

Mrstik recommended the council require double stacked snow fence for the beer garden during the Pig Out Celebration. He also recommended the council require the Betterment Committee to hire an additional officer. Motion by Van Ness, seconded by Patterson to approve the liquor license transfer for North End Tavern for June 4th and to require a double stacked snow fence for the outdoor service area and to hire an additional officer for the event. All voting in favor motion carried.

Motion by Patterson, seconded by Van Ness to approve Ordinance No. 2202, adding a new section for recycling fees. All voting in favor motion carried.

Motion by Patterson, seconded by Van Ness to waive the second and third reading for Ordinance No. 2202, adding a new section for recycling fees. All voting in favor motion carried.

Motion by Van Ness, seconded by Patterson to approve Resolution 22-21, approving contract and performance and/or payment bonds for the 2021 Watermain Improvements Project. All voting in favor motion carried.

The council discussed grant administration services and architectural services for rehabilitation of façade improvements for downtown business district. There will be upfront costs of about \$20,000 for architectural services prior to submitting the Downtown Revitalization grant. No action was taken.

Motion by Patterson, seconded by Van Ness to adjourn. All voting in favor motion carried.
